Samantha's New House



Samantha was hit by a car crossing the street and is now confined to a wheelchair. She requires 24-hour medical care and required a house that would meet her significant medical and daily living needs. Thus, the Samantha's House Foundation was born. With the help of community leaders, friends and family and other generous Hoosiers enough money was raised to build Samantha a house that would satisfy the everyday challenges of mobility that any other little girl or boy would take for granted.

Nichole's New House



Nicole has used an electric wheelchair since 2000, when she was injured in a car crash returning from a gymnastics meet at Ball State University. Her new house allows her to live independently. Her front door has an automatic door device making it easier for Nicole to enter her house. The house has elevated appliances so she can reach into the refrigerator and cook on the stove while in her wheelchair. The house also features a therapy room and a specialized garage.

GABBY AND ANTHONY

Gabby's New House



Gabby suffers from mitochondrial disease and is totally dependent on her parents. Gabby's new house has wide doorways and hallways along with a cable device that carries Gabby from her bed into the bathroom. A camera in Gabby's room helps her parents monitor her condition from other rooms when they are attending to her brothers and sisters.

Anthony's New House



Anthony lost 75% of his blood during delivery causing him to have a stroke, kidney and liver failure and brain damage which left him confined to a wheelchair. Anthony's new house is totally wheelchair accessible with wide doorways and hallways which enhances his mobility. His bedroom has therapy equipment and a cable device that carries Anthony from his bed into the bathroom which helps his family provide the best care possible.
